About the survey


A broad range of parents were included; 40% of respondents were fathers. This is one of the first times such a large group of fathers has been captured in a population-level parenting survey.

The survey results provide comprehensive information about Victorian parents, including their parenting practices and their relationships with their children. It explores parents' engagement in their children's education and learning, and where and how they access parenting information. It also tells us how much support parents feel they have, and how they are coping.


